Want to improve your game?

A number of the better players at the Club have offered to make themselves available to the less experienced as partners to play ongoing series (usually three sessions) on Thursday mornings. If there is sufficient interest, we will compile a list of those who are prepared to act as mentors.

Those wanting to get the guidance of the more experienced can select who they would like to play with and make contact. We recognise that people are often reluctant to put their hand up to

get some assistance to develop their game. We think that by allowing the "students" to pick their "teachers" it might become easier to take advantage of this offer.

Etiquette

As we encourage less experienced players to participate in sessions that may be "outside their comfort zone", it is important to make them feel welcome and extend to them some tolerance for slower play, which is understandable.

By the same token less experienced players should be aware that the speed of play is likely to be slightly faster than they are used to, and this is exacerbated when playing sets of three or more boards.

Post-mortems should be kept to a minimum and eliminated entirely if you are running out of time.

Remember, hand records are available at the close of play so you and your partner can discuss the hands at leisure. This is a particularly worthwhile practice if you are developing a new partnership.

If you are not familiar with operating the scoring tablet then avoid sitting in the south position as the tablet can be distracting and time consuming.

It is ENTIRELY against good etiquette for ANY player to gloat or to fume over a result once entered into the tablet. A brief neutral comment on the result is sufficient before moving on to the next board.

Once a new board is commenced discussion of a previous board should be over.
